COMMUNITY

I WORK WE SUCCEED is the new campaign by Oregon's Employment First initiative to promote the benefits of paid, integrated work in community jobs for people with intellectual and developmental (I/DD) disabilities. This is a collaborative effort with Oregon's Depts. of Education, Vocational Rehabilitation, and Developmental Disabilities.

Planning My Way to Work, a revised guide for students with disabilities leaving high school and their families to help navigate the transition from school to work and adult life, is now available to download from www.ocdd.org. Congratulations to the Oregon Legislature for passing three important pieces of legislation, including SB 777, state's version of the ABLE ACT. While more rules are still under review by the IRS, the ABLE ACT will allow monies in excess of the previous limit of \$2,000 to be held for the benefit of a person with disabilities without affecting government benefits. In addition, HB 5006 passed, which provides \$40 million to build affordable housing, and HB 2005 was enacted, which provides \$25 million for housing for people with mental illness.

Have you wondered how **Oregon** compares to other states in terms of how we support people with developmental and intellectual disabilities? According to a survey by United Cerebral Palsy, Oregon ranks #18 in the nation for its services to people with D/II.

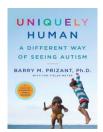
Google Impact Challenge: Disabilities
